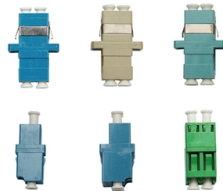

Best Practices Spacing: Where tray width allows, cables should be spaced rather than tightly bundled to improve airflow and reduce thermal penalties. Tray Selection: Perforated or ladder trays are preferred for high-current power feeders because they allow better heat dissipation. Solid trays are suitable for low-current or small instrumentation cables. Layering: Keeping cables in a single layer minimizes thermal derating. If multiple layers are unavoidable, the derating factor must be applied. Support and Protection: Use support blocks or cable ties to maintain spacing and prevent sagging, especially for large power cables.
