Distribution box wiring colors are standardized to identify live, neutral, and ground conductors, with variations depending on IEC, NEC, or local codes.

IEC (International) Color Codes
The IEC 60446 standard is widely used in Europe and many other countries. It specifies the following colors for AC systems:

- Live (Phase) wires: Brown (single-phase) or Brown, Black, Grey (three-phase)
- Neutral wire: Blue
- Protective Earth (Ground): Green/Yellow striped

DC systems: Positive is Red, Negative is Blue or Black depending on local practice

These colors help prevent miswiring, simplify maintenance, and ensure safety across installations in homes, commercial buildings, and industrial systems.

NEC (United States) and CEC (Canada) Color Codes
In the US and Canada, the National Electrical Code (NEC) and Canadian Electrical Code (CEC) define:

- Protective Ground: Green, Green/Yellow, or bare copper
- Neutral: White or Gray
- Live (Hot) wires: Any color except green, white, or gray; commonly Black, Red, or Blue for single-phase and three-phase systems

Three-phase systems: Black, Red, Blue (US); Black, Red, Blue, or Brown, Orange, Yellow (Canada)

These codes ensure that electricians can quickly identify circuits and maintain safety during installation or repairs.

Distribution Box Labeling
Proper labeling inside a distribution box is crucial: Each circuit breaker should be clearly labeled with the area or appliance it serves. Labels should be durable (vinyl or polyester) and legible. Modular boxes often include color-coded bus bars and terminal markings to match wiring colors. Always verify older installations, as older wiring may not follow current color standards.

Safety and Best Practices
Always turn off the main power before working inside a distribution box. Use insulated gloves and safety glasses. Verify wires with a multimeter if color alone is uncertain. Follow local regulations and standards to ensure compliance and safety. By adhering to these color codes and labeling practices, electricians and homeowners can reduce the risk of electrical hazards, simplify troubleshooting, and...
